ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

This is the 144th Annual Report of the Malden Public Library as mandated by a Special Act of the Legislature and the 16th Report of this President.


As Momma Rose sang in Gypsy, "Wherever we go, whatever we do; We're gonna go through it together."

And that's just what we did! A year of continuing COVID precautions presented the Library and staff as well as patrons with quite a different set of operating circumstances. Through it all, most services were provided but fewer on-site activities occurred. Zooming became the method of running meetings and presenting speakers and programs.

During the year precautions were somewhat eased – people could come back into the library (masked) and activities were resumed. Groups could come into the galleries to sketch; the John Day Exhibit was held; the Converse Family held its reunion. Reports from the Director and others detail many of these activities.

Through efforts by the Trustees and Administration, monies and grants were obtained to work on many important projects. Work on repairs to the Maccario Room, automation of entrance doors, restoration of the Olmsted Garden and an archive room in the Converse Building basement were begun and some finished. Generous donations by the Adelaid Breed Bayrd Foundation, John Giso and Michael Nutall, John Preotle and the Malden CPC are gratefully acknowledged. Other donors contributed to the Library's funds. Private funds made possible the purchase of a second John Day painting for the Library's collection.

Olmsted Garden Fund Ceremony Trustees Frank Molis, John Tramondozzi, John Giso, John Preotle & Michael Nutall, Library Director Dora St. Martin and Mayor Gary Christenson.



The Art Collection grew through purchase and donations (e.g. Alex Katz Foundation & Foundation Trust of Melrose) and the long-anticipated inventory of prints was begun with a grant from LSTA / MBLC Managing Fine Arts Program.

The circulation of our physical items returned to near pre-COVID levels. This year, the Board of Library Trustees joined a growing national trend by voting to remove overdue fines on most materials borrowed.

Trustee Rev. Martha Dominy resigned when she returned to New York after serving almost a decade on the Board; attorney John Parcellin, a Malden lawyer, was selected to succeed her.

In all, it was a fairly good year. We have rebounded.

We thank the Mayor, City Officials for their support as well as all our patrons who put up with inconveniences and were real troopers during this



time. I want to personally thank the administration and staff of the Library for continuing to do a splendid job under difficult circumstances. I want to especially thank my fellow Trustees who make my position not only tolerable, but a joy.

We have gotten through a tough time together and we will continue to do so.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

This is the 10th report of the Librarian and the 144nd submitted to the Board of Trustees.

On October 1, 1885, Edwin Shepard read the following poem, *The People's Response*, at the dedication of the Converse Memorial Building.

Behold a wonder in our midst!
Two kindred souls —our neighbors, friends
In life the wealth with which they're blest
Devote, in love, to life's great ends.
Their generous gift of love's demand
We consecrate most tenderly;
Memorial, ornate, and grand!
The People's University!







The Malden Chamber of Commerce celebrated its 130th anniversary. To commemorate the event, the Chamber held community birthday party on July 24th on the lawn of the Malden Public Library. The festivities will be part of the City of Malden's Summer Festivals 2021.



As a historic note, the first postpandemic community meeting held at the Library was the Malden Historical Society's Show & Tell Program.

Converse Family Reunion

This summer we honored the contribution of benefactors Elisha and Diana Converse (and Elisha's brother James) by hosting a long planned reunion of 60 Converse descendants. Family members enjoyed a welcome reception, historical lectures and tours of the art galleries. The attendees visited family graves at Woodlawn Cemetery, enjoyed a picnic at Fellsmere Park, an evening barbeque at Pine Banks Park and finally a community memorial service at the First Baptist Church. It was wonderful seeing so many family members visiting Malden (and some the Library) for the first time. A special thanks go to the Adelaide Breed Bayrd Foundation for their financial and staff support for the event.



Converse Art Galleries

A LSTA / MBLC Managing Fine and Decorative Arts Grant provided funding for beginning the first large-scale inventory of the Library's print and drawing collection. The project resulted in the full inventory of 60 fine art prints by Joseph Mallord William Turner 1775–1851, the majority from Turner's Liber Studiorum (1807-1809). The print collection was also highlighted by a series of lectures by working print makers Carolyn Muskat and Liz Sheperd and Harvard Museum Curator of Prints Elizabeth Rudy.

The art collection grew with generous gifts including two Japanese prints by Inuzo donated by Marilyn and Linda Glover; "The Cove" by Nicole Wittenberg donated by the Alex Katz Foundation; two works by John Day purchased with funding by Dr. Kempton Webb and Simmone Adriano; works by Constance Stella from John Giso and Michael Nutall; and a painting of a Portland street scene by Horace Burdick and a sketch by Fred Seager donated by John Tramondozzi. The Library was also loaned a work by Benjamin Soep by the Soep family for long-term display in the Ryder Gallery.

John Day Exhibition

Another opportunity for bringing people together came in October with a month-long exhibition, *John Day: A Glimpse of Color*. Following a successful solo show in Geneva, Switzerland, the work of Malden born artist John Day (1932-1982) came to the library following a closure of a Boston gallery due to the pandemic. Day's works are

found at the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Museum of Modern Art and the Musée Pompidou – and now in the library's permanent collection. The highlight of the exhibition was hosting a long awaited reunion of John Day's childhood friends and fellow members of MHS Class of 1949.





Modern Sojourner

Thanks to a generous loan by artist Gale Fulton Ross, the Library hosted a yearlong exhibition *Modern Sojourner*, *Sojourner Truth's Malden*. "Modern Sojourner" is a Fulton Ross tour de force done in her signature figurative style, capturing the wisdom and strength of the family matriarch. A fierce civil rights and arts activist since the 1960s, Fulton Ross has been representing the Black community as a painter, printmaker, sculptor and multimedia visual artist for decades. The exhibition explored the life and times of Sojourner Truth,



celebrated African-American evangelist, abolitionist and women's rights activist. Exhibition displays discussed Sojourner's life in New England including her slavery in the North, the Fugitive Slave Act, the resistance by enslaved people to their bondage; as well as Sojourner's long-standing friendships with Malden radical abolitionists Bishop Gilbert Haven and James Redpath.

The Library continued to showcase works by local artists as part of our monthly rotating art exhibition. This year's artist included Jason Zalk, Sarah Gerould, Adelaide (Addie) Rosenthal, Lisa Montague, Gurleen Anand, Samia Omran, Soukaina Karim, Edward Rice, Indra Persad-Milowe and Kevin Thai.



Local History

On June 30, the Library, the Malden Historical Society and the City of Malden co-hosted Malden's Annual Declaration Day at Bell Rock Cemetery. This year the event also honored the service of free and enslaved Black Soldiers of Malden who served during Revolution. A grant awarded to the Library from the Massachusetts SHRAB Veterans Heritage Fund will pay for the final monument to be installed in 2023.

The Library was honored to be part of the preparations for the re-dedication of the Herbert L. Jackson City Council Chambers at the City Hall. Herbert Jackson was the first African American to be elected to the City Council. The Library worked with Herbert's daughter Lee Van Allen (wife of former Library Trustee David Van Allen) to scan family photographs for a slideshow for the event.



Building and Grounds

Despite the pandemic, work continued on caring for the buildings. The engineering firm of Greg Structures North examined the Maccario Room floor, as part of a long term building plan. Unfortunately, this resulted in the need for immediate repair of the floor and ramp system.

Armour Door of Malden received the contract for automating the Park Street front entrance and work was completed in April.

Work continued on the Converse Archives funded by a grant from the Malden Community Preservation Committee (CPC). The project is slated to be completed in the spring of 2023.





American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

In October, the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC) used its ARPA funding to help libraries in twenty communities deemed "hard hit by COVID" by Governor Baker's office, including Malden. The Library received \$50,000 in special MBLC / ARPA funding. Working with the Boston Public Library, Malden received additional support through the Federal Communications Commission Emergency Connectivity Fund.

In January, the Malden state legislators Senator Jason Lewis and Representatives Steven Ultrino, Kate Lipper-Garabedian and Paul Donato announced additional funding from the Commonwealth's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The Malden Public Library was awarded \$100,000 to upgrade online services and technology.

The Library used this expanded funding to purchase laptops and chromebooks to distribute to library users, individuals and community organizations impacted by the pandemic. Chromebooks were provided to the Chinese Cultural Connection, Malden Overcoming Addiction and the Malden Warming Center.

Funds were used to enhance library services. The Library purchased 10 Powertalk digital translation devices (74 languages) to assist serving non-English speakers. The website was improved by the purchase of Niche Academy, an online and video tutorial for point of need for access library services remotely. Equipment to support virtual and hybrid

programs were purchased including two Owl Labs Video Conferencing systems, equipment for outdoor programs and two digital information kiosks.

Funds were used to digitize the Library's heavily-used historical newspaper catalog, covering years from 1884 to 2010. An estimated 147,000 pages in total were digitized during the project and will allow for remote access to this important community resource.



Library Staff

As we celebrated visitors returning to the Library, we also said goodbye to several members of our staff. Long time staff member and Senior Librarian Tina Vegelante retired in October. Tina had spent over 41 years as professional librarian and was known for her work with our homebound patrons. Tina pioneered the library's annual food drives and toy drives, helping Malden's underserved residents.



Long time Information Librarian Jean Slavkosky left the Library to take on a new position at the Cambridge Public Library. Besides her regular library duties, Jean was well-known in the community as the capable "question-master" for the Triple Threat Trivia Fundraisers. Yojana GC left to pursue her educational studies. With every good bye, follows a hello. The Library welcomed new librarians Ryan Reed and Stephen Deloney and new paraprofessional Veronica Valle Rodriquez.

I am so fortunate to work with a talented, experienced and dedicated Library staff, and a wonderful group of volunteers who routinely dedicate their time to our Library. I also want to thank the Board of Library Trustees, Mayor Gary Christenson, the City Councilors and the Malden community for their continued support of their public library.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT LIBRARIAN

This is the 10th report of the Assistant Librarian and the 144th submitted to the Board of Trustees.

It continued to be a year of trial and error. Although the Covid-19 restrictions were a thing of the past, here at the Library we weren't sure how the public was going to respond to in-person programming after not gathering in person for over a year. In response to that uncertainty, the Library worked to be able to offer programming and equipment that would breech that divide.



Technology

This year, technology updates included Windows 10 computers imaged and rolled out to not just staff but all patron-facing desks. The Library's ILS (Integrated Library System, or the software that tracks all of our materials) was upgraded and would only run on Windows 10. In all, this included 22 computers that were upgraded.



The pandemic highlighted inequalities in internet access for residents in Malden and across the country. In an effort to combat this, and to get internet access into homes of anyone needing it, the Commonwealth started a program for free internet access through T-Mobile Hot Spots. Malden participated in this program and had 30 hot spots circulating through the community. The program was such a

success that when it ended, Malden purchased 20 hot spots to continue circulating to the community. Additional equipment was purchased to allow hybrid meetings and programs at the Library. Although most people have become more comfortable attending in-person meetings, the option to hold a program in our Galleries and have it accessible to others at home has continued to be popular.

Friends of the Malden Public Library

The Friends began meeting regularly in the Library as opposed to virtually as they had done the previous year. Through a concerted sign-up effort from the both Library and the Friends group, new volunteers began to attend meetings. The Friends' decided to hold "pop-up" book sales once a month on Saturdays, either outside on the front lawn in summer and in the book sales were very popular and continued to draw people each month.





Malden Reads

2021-2022 was the 12th year of Malden Reads, and the title chosen was *An American Sunrise* by Joy Harjo, the first Native American Poet Laureate in the United States. The work deals with loss, memory, and the nature of joy and hope. The collection also explores human rights and socio-political equity across American cultures and communities, the values of various indigenous peoples, and the importance of our land and environment. By choosing a poetry anthology, Malden Reads was able to introduce many to a type of literature that they were not well acquainted with. It was again, a great success. As we step through the portal of the pandemic from the "before times," we see this collection as a springboard for ideas and conversations that will help us heal and move forward as a community."

Adult Programming

2022 was a rebuilding year for public programming. We held 305 inperson programs with 8,732 attendees; as well as 77 virtual program (via zoom) with 1,567 attendees.

CAMP MPL / Summer Reading

The state wide theme for the 2022 Summer Reading Program in Massachusetts was: "Read Beyond the Beaten Path" which encouraged participants with outdoor themes and concepts to get out and explore the natural environment. This posed a particular challenge for a library in an urban environment and with students with little access a traditional summer camp experience. The goal of our summer program was to capture a summer camp feel at the library and promote the joy of reading.









A beautiful "CAMP MPL" logo was used on bags, t-shirts and reading challenge badges. Programs included a live creature show, a visit with

the Whale-Mobile, outdoor arts & crafts from bead bracelet making to hands-on painting and a family movie night at Park at Rivers Edge. One program enjoyed by all was the summer butterfly growing and release program. Children were able to name the butterflies before their release party.



The Library bid farewell to Camp MPL with an old fashioned community picnic party on the lawn. The reading program was sponsored Preotle, Lane & Associates, the Trustees of the Library, the Friends of the Malden Public Library and the Malden Cultural Council.















Childrens Services

The Children's Department serves children from birth through fifth grade, along with their parents, caregivers and teachers. In addition to great books, the staff offered regular storytimes, special events and the summer reading program. The staff promoted an early literacy project called "1,000 Books Before Kindergarten."

Despite children and parents beginning to return to the library, outdoor programs and grab & go crafts continued to be very popular. The outdoor Story Walk continued in the warmer months. Programs included Big Book Storytimes, Big Bubbles on the Lawn, Drum2TALK: Drumming for Social Justice, Curious Creatures and Chess for Kids.

New resources for children included Tumble Books and Tumble Math for Kids. New Wonderbooks were added with a generous donation from the David DeMaria Foundation. Every Wonderbook read-along is a children's print book with a pre-loaded wth an audiobook player.







Young Adult / Teen Services

The Malden Public Library was thrilled to be selected to be part of NASA@ My Library, a nationwide science-technology programming initiative. The Malden Public Library was one of just 60 libraries nationwide and the only library in Massachusetts to be chosen for the project.



As a NASA@ My Library Partner, the Library received training and grant funds to hold public programs that explored NASA science and technology, specifically around NASA's newest next-generation telescope, the James Webb Space Telescope.



Programs provided learning opportunities in STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and math). Students enjoyed a year-long exploration of space with programs on space food, building a telescope exploring the moon and the galaxy, model balloon rocket building, advanced paper model kit of the new James Webb Telescope and streaming of the James Webb official launch on December 25, 2021.



The NASA@ My Library grant was a partnership between the National Center for Interactive Learning (NCIL) at the Space Science Institute (SSI), the ALA Public Programs Office and the Lunar and Planetary Institute (LPI).



Other young adult programs include teen online book readings and discussions, afternoon movies, grab & go crafts, yoga on the lawn and gallery art tours.
