### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

This is the 10th Annual Report of this President and the 138<sup>th</sup> Report of the Malden Public Library as mandated by a Special Act of the State Legislature.

After the storm damages of last year, this year was relatively quiet. We experienced the calm after the storm. Major projects that had been delayed due to the priority of storm repairs were again undertaken: updating security systems including a security audit of the art galleries; updating lighting in all three art galleries; repairing the garden wall and masonry on the Converse Building; inventory of the print collection.

The Library and the Historical Society continued to cooperate on collections and exhibits including *Uniforms: Dressing the Part*. Plans were made for future dual exhibits including one on an Asian theme.

The Library continues to expand its world-renowned art collection and reputation with gifts and purchases. An impressionistic landscape, *Country Road*, by Malden artist Ernest Ipsen was added to the Library's collection of this artist. The Richardson/Davenport four-sided art bench was photographed and included in the work *Boston Furniture*, *1700-1900*; and the Gerome will be going to the Norman Rockwell Museum on loan next summer.

Patrons and former patrons have been generous; they have helped maintain many of the Library activities and improve the art area by donations and bequests. The Adelaide Breed Bayrd Foundation, Preotle and Lane; Eastern Bank Charitable Trust, and the McKinley Trust and others are to be thanked.

The Director, Administration and Staff continued to do a remarkable job coordinating the wide range of Library activities.

The Board of Trustees continues to provide support (mostly unseen, behind the scenes) - financial, moral and expertise-wise. I personally thank them for their continued support and helpfulness to me in carrying out my role on the Board.

Although the City has been generally supportive of the Library and its activities and we want to thank the Mayor, City Council and all others who have helped, it has become apparent that a number of concerns regarding municipal support have continued if not actually increased.

The Library has been on waivers for nine years for State Aid due to insufficient City funds allocated in the budget. If the state denies these waivers, the Library would be decertified and its patrons stand to lose many benefits especially interlibrary loans from any library. Staffing is still 2.5 positions short of what is needed. An incentive for early leaving by the City last year hit the Library hard when two full-time staff members opted to take this incentive. Level funding year after year is a problem when all costs continue to rise. In addition, the administrative assistant has been at the same step grade and not upgraded for over 15 years despite many requests by the director.

Although the Library needs and wants more from the City, we understand the City's financial situation. We also hope our needs will be recognized and soon be fulfilled. To paraphrase a defunct TV program "Everyone loves the Library"! We all recognize the Library as a treasure in Malden. Please show your love for the Library! Help us make the Library even better.

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

This is the Fourth report of the Librarian and the 138th submitted to the Board of Trustees.

The theme for 2016 could easily be "Rise to the Challenge." Despite staffing and budgetary challenges, the library staff rose to the challenge and offered a wide range of programs and services to Malden residents. Although programs had to be canceled due to staffing, we continued our efforts to concentrate of the areas of early literacy and reading readiness, job help and technology assistance, arts and STEM education, and life-long learning.

Malden residents showed their continued need for the library and checked out over 288,000 items. The library presented 423 special programs with an attendance of over 19,000. In addition, the new digital resources and an updated website provided 24/7 access to online books, magazines, movies and music.

We continued the ongoing work to preserve and expand access to the Converse Memorial Building. We completed necessary exterior masonry work, repaired the slate roof, and installed the restored historic gate. We did not neglect the "new" Park Street addition – now over 20-years old. Work was done on the heating and air conditioning system, a new sound system was installed in the meeting room, new computers were installed in the children's and young adult rooms, and grants were submitted for a much-needed renovation of the restrooms.

One of the highlights of my year was the work done to preserve Malden's early town records. The library oversaw the digitization of the town records from 1695 to 1812. Among the documents digitized was the original town notes regarding the Malden Instructions of 1776. In this document, the freemen of the Town of Malden wrote to the Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia that it was their "ardent wish of our souls that America may become a free and independent state" and "if they [the Continental Congress] should declare America to be a free and independent republic, your constituents would support and defend the measure, to the last drop of their blood, and the last farthing of their treasure."

We continue to provide more access to the Converse Building and art collections. Sadly, due to staffing we had to cut local history hours; however numerous tours were given to residents, visiting scholars, and students from Malden's elementary schools and the high school. We continued our very popular Art Adventure Story times led by staff from the Museum of Fine Arts Boston, as well as a very creative weekly arts and crafts program led by our own children's room staff.

In April, as part of Malden Reads, I presented the "The Art Surviving Hard Times," a slide lecture on the life and work of WPA artist Yvonne Twining Humber. Her work, *Factory Town*, hangs in the Ryder Gallery.

Working with the Trustee Art Committee, the Library acquired several works of art for the collection including *Country Road* by Ernest Ipsen and *Salem Road* by Albion Bicknell. Finally, we completed a longneeded security audit of the art galleries. We will be implementing many of the audit recommendations next year including the installation of a security camera system in the galleries. Much time was also spent with Murray Brothers Construction and Stirling Architects planning a major re-lighting project in the galleries, generously funded by the Adelaide Breed Bayrd Foundation. That project should be completed early next year.

My thanks to the library staff, the Board of Trustees, the Mayor's Office, Friends of the Library and our many community volunteers who work to bring you the best public library we can be.

#### REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

As Assistant Director, FY16 was a busy year. The summer began with many rounds of interviews for two paraprofessional positions that opened here at the library. We were happy to add to our staff both Jennifer Browning and Lily Mysona. When Cathy Bartlett decided to take another position with the city, we knew that her shoes would be hard to fill. Luckily, Monica Hatzis found her way to us and she has been a great addition to the Children's Room.

Fall brought our annual Book Sale, run by the Friends of the Malden Public Library. The Book Sale again went for three days; Sunday 1-4 was our "unadvertised \$5/bag" sale, and many turned out to fill their paper bags with a wide variety of materials, including many children's books. The winter is always a busy time for us, and this year was no exception, with Triple Treat Trivia in January and the Malden Reads kick-off celebration in February. Both were very well attended. I also started a Drop-In Craft night on the 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday of January through May. The concept was for patrons to bring their needlework to the library, stitch away, and meet others to talk and learn from each other.

The 14<sup>th</sup> Annual Wine Tasting was held on Friday, May 6<sup>th</sup> and was a very successful event. 300 tickets were sold and a record amount was raised by the Friends for MPL.

With summer weather beginning, our thoughts turned to the annual Ice Cream Social to kick off our Summer Reading program. Again this year approximately 650 people, children and adults, stopped by on a hot and sunny day to get free ice cream and sign up for summer reading.

I look forward to the challenges and successes that FY2017 will bring.

#### **STAFF CHANGES**

As we forged ahead, the Library welcomed new staff members: Jennifer Browning, Lily Mysona, Derek Diggs, and Monica Hatzis. We also welcomed Michael Rennie, as our new custodian.









#### FRIENDS OF THE MALDEN PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Friends of the Malden Public Library is a community organization dedicated to assisting the Library in realizing its mission. The Friends organize many events to raise funds for the Library. Their two main fundraising events are the wildly popular annual Book Sale held in October and Wine Tasting held in April. In 2016.

Once again the Friends' Annual Wine Tasting was a sell out and a great success. The event is a staple in Malden's annual social calendar. Special thanks to Therese Perkins and all the Friends for their hard work.









#### **TRIPLE THREAT TRIVIA 18!**

The Malden Public Library held its 18th Annual Triple Threat Trivia fundraiser at Anthony's Function Hall on January 28. Team Parcellin took home the cup this year despite fierce competition.

An amazing amount of thanks goes to all our volunteers, plus our loyal business sponsors: Shapiro and Hender, Malden Transportation, the Medeiros Family (Dunkin Donuts) the E.E. Burns and Son Funeral Homes, Rucci, Bardaro & Falzone, Walker Mechanical Inc., and the Malden Advocate for their support; and a special thanks to Committee Chair Ellie Cushing and Master of Ceremonies Paul Solano.

#### YOUNG ADULT SERVICES

This year we installed two new computers in the Young Adult room. These machines are powerful enough to edit digital content; including videos and music. While they look like the rest of the library's computers, they represent a step forward technologically. The library also purchased two sets of digital cameras, microphones and headphones for producing digital content. Programs like Skype and Adobe Elements were purchased for additional content creation and communication capabilities.

Young Adult programs included a new Lego Club, a Lego Robotics Program with the YMCA, teen jewelry making, afternoon movies, and special programs during holidays, school vacation and exam weeks.







#### **CHILDREN'S SERVICES**

The children's summer reading theme for 2016 was "Every Hero Has a Story." An award-winning storyteller, Diane Edgecomb, brought marvelous tales to life in "Superheroes Around the World," funded by the Malden Cultural Council. Other summer programs were funded by Preotle, Lane & Associates and included Animal Adventures (which brought eight animals including a lemur and a Canadian lynx), Wingmasters (featuring five North American birds of prey), and The Spoon Man.

In the fall, we continued to offer Preschool Storytime, Song & Rhyme Time, Creative Drama, and quarterly Mayor Storytimes, along with the new bi-weekly Storytime Fun on Saturdays. As the year progressed, the Friends of the Malden Public Library funded Sparky's Puppets, Mad Science of Greater Boston's Eggbert 'n' Ice, and Creature Teachers (featuring a kinkajou, among other rainforest animals). Throughout the school year, we offered Reading Roots, the kindergarten enrichment series, featuring programs with Let's Gogh Art, musician Steve Blunt, Bug Works, Little Scientists' Crazy Chemistry, Click-a-Bricks, MFA's Artful Adventures, Kids Yoga with Becky Small, and Mad Science of Greater Boston's Dinosaur Fossils

The Malden Cultural Council funded several programs this year: Diane Edgecomb, MFA's Artful Adventures, and in late June: Circus Minimus' One-Man Circus in-a-Suitcase.





#### **ADULT SERVICES**

The residents of Malden continue to actively support their library. 110 patrons volunteered their time to in order for a record high of 1,977 hours. The library welcomed and trained 74 new volunteers in FY2016.

Malden residents continue to rely on the Malden Public Library to access area museums and cultural institutions at a reduced admission cost. 1,228 passes were checked out in FY16, an increase of 4.2% over the previous year. This year, we added passes to the Institute of Contemporary Art, the new Edward M. Kennedy Institute, and The John F. Kennedy Library & Museum.

Movie Nights at the Library continue to be very popular. The Library showed 11 movies, including: *The Second Best Exotic Marigold Hotel, Ex Machina, The Conjuring, Jurassic World, How The Grinch Stole Christmas, Spotlight, Creed, Brooklyn,* and *The Finest Hours*.

Other program highlights this year were a talk by author Mike Tougias on his book (turned Disney movie), *The Finest Hours*. Staff provided story telling at the Fairy House Festival at Pine Banks and Bubble and Books in Miller Park, and promoted library services at the Harvest Moon Festival. Adults enjoyed special programs in origami, knitting, adult coloring, adult board game night, and a night of readings by local authors. The Live on the Lawn Summer Concert Series sponsored by Eastern Bank brought the music of Ashanti Munir, *Four Guys in Tuxes*, *Hungry Town*, and an outdoor movie for children.



#### MALDEN READS

The 2016 Malden Reads book this year was *The Martian* by Andy Weir. Highlights of the program included "Sunset, Storytelling and Stargazing" on Waitt's Mount, community dinners, a book discussion with the Mayor at the Library, and showing of the movie *The Martian* starring Matt Damon at the Jenkins Auditorium. Movies were also shown at the Library including *Everest* and *In The Shadow of the Moon*.



# WORLD LANGUAGE COLLECTION & ENGLISH AS SECOND LANGUAGE CLASSES

The World Languages collection expanded to include languages such as Arabic, French, Spanish, Haitian-Creole, Vietnamese, Hindi, Portuguese, and many others. The Library continues to provide weekly English Conversation class to people from about 53 different countries, including Haiti, China, India, Poland, Morocco, Belgium, El Salvador, Iran, Peru, Congo, Brazil, Syria, Mongolia, Belarus, Thailand, France, Mozambique, Ethiopia, Spain, Algeria, Turkey, Mexico, Indonesia, the Dominican Republic, Saudi Arabia, Nepal, Vietnam, Senegal, Colombia, and many others. The staff provided tours of the library and collections for students from the Immigrant Learning Center and the Malden High School ESL classes.



#### **AUDIO-VISUAL COLLECTION**

The Audiovisual collection continues to change as technology improves and advances. There was a significant increase in the use of digital media. Throughout the year staff taught patrons how to use hoopla, OverDrive, Mango Languages, and One-Click digital. The following items were added to the Audiovisual collection: 163 music CDs, 107 Blu-Rays, 110 audiobooks, and 805 DVDs. We also added more lockable DVD cases for increased security.

# CIRCULATION, TECHNICAL PROCESSING & CATALOGING

Making collections easier to find and use is the mission of the Technical Services Department. Several changes were implemented to connect people with materials more quickly and to simplify complicated circulation rules and procedures. The circulation, technical processing, and information staff worked to get materials on the shelf more quickly, have more copies on hand to meet demand, and to pull and process items with reserves more efficiently. The Large Print collection was moved to the first for easier access for our senior and visually impaired readers resulting in a 35% increase in usage of the collection. The Cataloging and Technical Services staff cataloged and processed 9,287 books, 271 CDs, and 1,135 DVDs.
