

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

This is the 12th Report of this President and the 140th Report of the Malden Public Library as mandated by a Special Act of the Legislature.

There is an old Italian saying that the old often used dish, despite its flaws and imperfections, lasts longer that a new one. The saying loses in the translation. But what it boils down to is the fact that the old one is treated with more love and respect; the new is liable to break by carelessness. What it means is that the old can survive better than the new because it is more appreciated. This seems quite true whether we apply this saying to our Library or ourselves.

This past year was a year of no great disasters or emergencies. In addition to providing services for the public, it allowed the Board to work on ongoing problems in building maintenance, policy development and both short and long-range planning. Some necessary repairs were accomplished – boilers were replaced, patrons' bathrooms were remodeled, the chairlift was replaced. When weeding work was done in the basement, problems were spotted in the structure and work was started on those repairs.

The Long-Range Planning Committee, under the direction of Trustee Moreschi, brought plans up to date, determining items that could be more readily handled. Among, these were the continued Art Inventory in preparation for an appraisal. During the Inventory of prints, a number of Japanese woodblock prints were "rediscovered". Theses became the centerpiece of a joint exhibit with the Malden Historical Society. Other Japanese art, clothing and porcelains from the Society rounded out the exhibit. Lectures on Tea and Ikebana were included.

Plans for a WW1 exhibit in fall 2018 were begun and even plans for a Converse Bicentennial program in 2020.

The Library continued to loan out its art to other museums, provide photographs of old Malden buildings and views. The Collection increased by purchases and donations.

Fundraising continued with a few changes. The Wine Tasting was replaced by a Beer Fest, two book sales were held. Triple Threat Trivia again drew many competitive groups as players.

Library policies were reviewed and brought up to date by staff and Trustees.

The Library continues to be a center of activity providing services for all groups - children, adults, students and professionals – all the residents of Malden. It is amazing not only the amount of work but the quality of work that goes on in the Library. The staff at all levels must be recognized and thanked.

Sincere thanks to all our patrons who drive us to do more and better; the Mayor and Council for their help; our many donors and funders who concretely show their belief in our work; my fellow Trustees for their commitment.

The City is proud of its Library and staff and rightly so.

The Board is committed and will keep patching the old dish to make it serve for a long time!

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

This is the 6th report of the Librarian and the 140th submitted to the Board of Trustees.

"Every season hath its pleasures." Thomas Moore (1779–1852)

Every season has something to offer. This report will highlight some of the very special programs from the past twelve months. It is important to remember, however, that it is the services and programs the library staff provides day after day – season after season – that define our library. Librarians helping people find information and use new technologies, circulation staff providing readers' advisory and friendly customer service, free access internet, assistance with downloading digital materials, help with employment and career resources, and providing free activities and educational programs for children and teens. As I look back at *the* past year, I am so proud of everything we have accomplished and look forward to another great year ahead.

The American Library Association's new initiative "Libraries Transforming Communities" highlights the role libraries play in helping community members engage in civic dialogue about local and national issues. In November, the Library hosted a Citizen Lyceum on "Understanding Democracy and the Bill of Rights." The program was led by Roger Desrosiers of the Massachusetts Center for



Civic Education, and co-sponsored by Malden Reads, the Chinese Culture Connection, Malden C O R E – Community Organizing for Racial Equity, and the American Association for Arab Women.

Community conversation continued at a lecture by Dr. John Hill on his new book, "Adam Smith's Equality and the Pursuit of Happiness" and a a talk by former Educational Commissioner David Driscoll on his book "Commitment and Common Sense: Leading Education Reform in Massachusetts." Public programs highlighted services of community organizations, including: ABCD's Homeless Outreach Program, Mystic Valley Opportunity Center, Cambridge Health Alliance, and Malden Overcoming Addiction. The Library also worked with Malden Historical Society and the City of Malden on a wonderful celebration of the 125th Anniversary of the Pledge of Allegiance and the 3rd Annual Malden Declaration Day.







The Converse Building's Art Galleries attracted visitors of all ages, from school age students to visitors from as far away as Japan and England.

The Library was gifted several new works, including *Boatyard*, *Edam*, by the Malden born abstract artist Jason Berger.

The Library's Japanese print collection had its first public showing since 1913 in the exhibition "Lasting Impressions of Japan: Hokusai & Hiroshige and Beyond." The exhibition in collaboration with the Malden Historical Society included prints, traditional dress and textiles, and



ceramic arts. A series of programs were presented include kimono origami, ikebana flower arrangement, and an program on Chinse tea and art.





Arts programming expanded with a new monthly rotating art gallery in the Park Street hall. In March, Malden watercolorist Rod Peterson kicked off the series with his watercolor collection "A Few of My Favorite Places to Paint."

TRIPLE THREAT TRIVIA 20

On January 28, 2018, the Library held its 20th Annual Triple Threat Trivia Fundraiser. Sadly, it was the last trivia



event to be hosted by our amazing Committee Chair Ellie Cushing. We hope to see Ellie at a trivia table in the future.

The Trivia Fundraiser held at Anthony's Function Hall is always a fun evening with Master of Ceremonies Paul Solano keeping the evening lively. A special thanks go to Jean Slavkovsky, Jennifer Browning and Caron Guilgi for co-chairing the event. Thanks also go to our special business sponsors: E. E. Burns and Son Funeral Home, Shapiro & Hender, the Medeiros Family (Dunkin'), Walker Mechanical Inc., Breen and Sullivan Services, the Brennan Group, and the Malden Advocate.



Thanks to funding from the Adelaide Breed Bayrd Foundation the wheelchair lift to the Converse Memorial Building was replaced and the Park Street public restrooms on the first floor were remodeled. We also worked on replacing the library's outdated steam boilers.

Friends of the Malden Public Library

The annual Book Sale was held October 27 and 28, 2017 and continued to be a very successful fund-raiser for the Friends. Because of the success of the annual book sale, the Friends decided to hold 2 additional "mini book sales" during the year on Wednesday afternoons. These were well-attended and will continue this year.

The past few years have shown an explosion of small local craft breweries in the area, including Malden. Because of that, the Friends decided that instead of continuing with the annual Wine Tasting, they would embrace a new challenge and not only switch up the event but the time of year. So for 2018, the Friends will hold a *Brews for Books* event in the Fall.

The Friends also represented the Library at the *Chamber of Commerce Halloween* event, giving out children's books instead of candy (and the books were VERY well received!), and at the *Bubbles and Books* event held by the Kiwanis. The Friends of Library funded new furniture for the young adult room, new computers, museum passes, high demand books, and programs for adults, teens, and children.









Malden Reads

This year Malden Reads reached its 8th year milestone. *The Hate U Give* by Angie Thomas was the 2018 book selection. The Library was again involved in planning community events for the months-long program.

A highlight this year was a book discussion and online skype with the newly formed community reads project in Charlottesville, Virginia.



SUMMER

The Summer Reading Program kicked off with the annual Ice Cream Social sponsored by Dairy Delight. Thanks to funding from Preotle, Lane and Associates and the Friends of the Malden Public Library children and teens had a full summer of educational and fun programming. This year's theme was Build A Better World. All ages were encouraged to read over the summer and special prizes and certificates were awarded.







During the summer, library staff encouraged residents to take part in "#whatsyourfour" – a social media campaign highlighting people's favorite books. Mayor Christenson added his Facebook post and the message: "Read, Read, and Read" is what my Mom said to me growing up and thanks to the @MaldenMAlibrary I was able to do so."



The Children's and Teen Departments were extremely busy over the summer months. Summer events included a live animal show: Creature Teacher, a STEM-focused LEGO & Snap Circuit Playtime, KIDSTOCK! Theater with fun interpretations of classic tales (Beauty & the 7 Dwarves), a Bubble Blowing event on the lawn, and the Pumpernickel Puppets' Sir George and the Dragon, and much more.

The Young Adult Department offered jewelry making, anime and gaming events, and young adult movie afternoons. Teens who read at least 5 hours a week were eligible for weekly prizes and a prize was presented to the teen who read the most.

On August 21, Library staff went old-school for the "Great American Eclipse" and built shoe-box viewers to view the historic solar eclipse.



The Live on the Lawn Summer Series kicked off with the sounds of the *Endless Summer* band. The band played warm weather favorites by the *Beach Boys, The Beatles* and Bob Marley and fun dance music that got everyone moving their feet in the grass. The summer ended with a packed house for an outdoor showing of the family film *Moana*. The Summer Series is sponsored by the Eastern Bank Charitable Foundation and the Friends of the Malden Public Library.

Summer fun also included story time at the Annual Fairy House Festival held at Pine Banks Park. Despite heavy rain, patrons also enjoyed time at Pine Banks for "From Walden to Malden" – a celebration of the 200th birthday of Henry David Thoreau.





FALL

It feels like summer just began, and then before you know it, the stores are filled with school supplies and its back-to-school. As the bell rung for the first day of school, the Malden Public Library was ready to provide resources for adult and child literacy and life-long learning.



September is Library Card Sign-up Month, a time when libraries nationwide join together to remind parents, caregivers and students that signing up for a library card is the first step towards academic achievement. Library orientations and tours help new users find all the amazing resources available through their new library card. Students from the Immigrant Learning Center were proud of their new cards.

It is said that the public library is the bridge over the digital divide. With millions of Americans – over 35% of adults - without broadband access at home, our library staff is always busy helping novice computer users, including seniors and individuals with disabilities, get the information and help they need.



The Children's Department's targeted the early literacy needs of Malden families. This year, like in the past, the children's room was filled to capacity for Song & Rhyme Story Time and the Panda Storytime and Crafts.

Through the Anna Yaghijian Fund the library provides free enrichment programs for kindergarten-aged children and their parents from resource materials to public programs.











WINTER

Winter is the time to warm up with a good book, magazine, or movie – and to visit the Library for a fun holiday program. This past December, Greg Cook and Keri Percival led a holiday craft making workshop for kids and their families. The children created reindeer masks that were later worn in the City of Malden Holiday Parade.



Library staff and members of the Friends of the Library and Malden Reads Committee (and their families) passed out free books during the Parade of Holiday Traditions.







Following the parade, the Annual Holiday Tree Lighting on the library lawn was a big hit.

Malden residents were entertained by the very talented Malden High School Choral Society at the Annual Holiday Concert, sponsored by the Friends of the Library, Malden Historical Society, and the Victorian Society.







Throughout the season, patrons dropped off food and bought gifts for those less fortunate through the Salvation Army's Annual Food Drive and Angel Tree Program.

SPRING

Spring is always a special time for libraries – it's American Library Month!

In March, the Library hosting performances by The Immigrant Learning Center theater class. They performed two original plays Arriving and Lost in Translation. Drawn from the students' life experiences, the plays explored the process of arriving to the United States and the misunderstandings caused by language barriers, which can






be simultaneously funny and challenging. The performers came from many countries, including Albania, Brazil, China, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Haiti, India, Iran, Morocco, South Korea and Venezuela.

For over ten years the Malden Public Library has offered weekly ESL conversation classes on Wednesdays. Library staff also offered tours to over 220 students from the Immigrant Learning Center and the Malden High School ESL class.

Among the spring programs was an adult origami workshop, a pastel art class led by Gregory Maichack, a lecture by John Root on "Edible Wild Plants of the Northeast," and a book talk by Malden poet David Surette.





International Firefighters' Day is observed on *May* 4. At the Library, children were on hand to meet Firefighter Rick Menard, listen to a story, and learn about fire safety and what firefighters do. Guest reader Ted Louis-Jacques of Malden Rising Leaders also read stories. Children's Librarian Rebecca Smith showed the children how a firefighter puts on their safety suit.





May is also Haitian Heritage Month. The Library was proud to host a celebration with a special presentation exploring Haiti's rich history, art, food, and music by Nekita Lamour; and a lecture by Library Director Dora St. Martin entitled "Slavery, Abolition and Haiti — A Look at Malden History," exploring the lives of Malden slaves, slave owners, and nineteenth century abolitionists.

BY THE NUMBERS

Malden residents continue to use their library enthusiastically. In FY2018, the Library circulated 361,629 items to library card holders and 46,267 items to other libraries throughout the state. Library staff answered 89,952 reference questions and assisted an average of 700 public computer and wifi users per week. The Technical Services, Circulation, and Catalog Departments kept items flowing onto the library shelves all year long. The Library programming staff offered 303 special programs throughout the year, attended by 16,943 children, teen and adults.
