At a Legal Town meeting in Malden May 27 1776

- 1 To see if the Town will Chose a Committee to advise the Person chosen to represent them in the next General Court whether that if the Honorable Congress should for the Safety of the Colonies declare them Independent of the Kingdom of Great Britain they the said Inhabitants will solemnly engage with their lives and fortunes to support them in the measure.
  - 2 To see if the Town will Chose a Committee man in the room of Mr Nathaniel Jenkins Deeps to reckon with the Town Treasurer.
  - 3 To see if the Town will empower the Person agreed with to collect the Rents uncollected in the lists committed to Mr Jacob Pain Deeps when Constable
  - 4 To see if the Town will consider any matters of a publick nature and act thereon as occasion may require
- Voted Mr Ezra Sargent Moderator  
 to Chose a Committee to advise the Representative  
 The Town resolved themselves into a Committee the Rec'd Mr Willis was chosen Chairman the Committee proceeded to consider the matter and prepared the following Instructions for their Representative and reported the said Instructions to the Town for their consideration and the question was put whether the Report and Instructions prepared by the Committee be agreeable and it did in the affirmative by a unanimous vote

Sir

To Mr Ezra Sargent

A Resolution of the late Honorable House of Representatives: Calling upon the several Towns in this Colony to express their mind, with respect to the important Question of American Independence is the occasion of our now instructing you, the time was Sir when we loved the King and the People of Great Britain with an affection truly filial we felt our selves interested in their Glory: we shared in their joys & sorrows we chearfully poured the fruit of all our labours into the lap of the mother Country & without reluctance exposed our blood and our treasure in their cause.

These were our Sentiments towards Great Britain while she continued to act the part of a Parent State we felt ourselves happy in our Connection with her nor wished to be Disjoined but our Sentiments are altered it is now the Ardent wish of ourselves that America may become a free & Independent States.

a sense of unprovoked Injuries will arouse the Resentment of ye most Peacefull. Such Injuries these Colonies have Received from Britain unjustifiable Claims have been made by the King & his Ministers to Tax us without our Consent. these Claims have been Prosecuted in a manner cruel & unjust to the highest Degree. the Wantick Policy of Administration hath induced them to send fleets and Armies to America that by Depriving us of our trade & cutting the throats of our Brethren they might awe us into Submission & Erect a System of Despotism in America which should so far enlarge the Influence of the Crown as to enable it to rivet their Shacles upon the People of Great Britain.

This was brought to a crisis upon the ever memorable Nineteenth of April we remember the fatal Day the Expiring groans of our murdered Countrymen yet Vibrat on our Ears! we now behold the flames of their Peaceful Dwellings ascending to Heaven we hear their Blood crying to us from the Ground Vengeance & Charging us as we value the Race of their manes to have no further Connection with a King who can unfeelingly hear of the Slaughter of his Subjects & Compeledly sleep with their Blood upon his Soul:

The manner in which the war has been Prosecuted hath confirmed us in these Sentiments: Piracy & murder Robery & breach of faith have been conspicuous in ye Conduct of the Kings Troops Themselves Towns have been attacked & Destroyed: the Ruines of Charlestown which are daily in our view daily Remind us of this: the Cries of ye Widows & Orphans demand our Attention they demands that a Hand of pity Should wipe ye tear from there Eye & that the Sword of their Country Should Avenge their wrongs.

We long Entertained hopes that the spirit of the British Nation would once more induce them to assert their own and our Rights & Bring to Justice Punishment the Elevated Villains who have Transplanted upon ye sacred Rights of men & affronted ye Majesty of the People, we hope in vain they have lost their love to freedom they have lost their spirit of just resentment we therefore renounce with disdain our Connection with a Kingdom of Slaves, we bid a final adieu to Britain Could an accommodation be now assaid we have reason to think that it would be fatal to the Liberties of America, we should soon catch ye contagion of Slavery & Despotism which hath subjected Nations to lawless Domination, ware we placed in the situation we ware in in the year 1773 ware the Powers of appointing to Office, & Commanding the militia in the hands of Governors our acts Trade and Manufactor would be cramp'd:

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Nay more than this the life of every man who has been active in the cause of his Country would be endangered for these reasons as well as many others which might be produced we are confirmed in our opinion that the present age will be deficient in their duty to God their posterity & themselves if they do not establish an American Republick this is the only form of Government which we wish to see established for we can never be willingly subject to any other King than He who being possessed of infinite wisdom goodness & rectitude is alone fit to possess unlimited power.  
we have freely spoken our sentiments upon this important subject but we mean not to dictate, we have unbounded confidence in the wisdom & uprightness of the Continental Congress with pleasure we recollect that this affair is under their direction and we now instruct you Sir to give them the strongest assurance that if that they should declare America to be a free & independent Republick your Constituance will support and defend the measure to the last drop of their blood & the last farthing of their treasure,

Voted Samuel Merritt be a Committee man in the room of Mr Nathaniel Jenkins Yeap to reckon with the Town Treasurer  
Voted To empower the Committee to agree with Sam Peirson to collect the rates uncollected in the Lists committed to Mr Jacob Bain Yeaps  
Voted To adjourn the meeting to Monday the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of June at 6 o'clock PM  
June 4<sup>th</sup> meet according to adjournment

The Committee then reported that they agreed with Mr Ebenezer Sergeant to gather the rates that was uncollected in the Lists committed to Mr Jacob Bain Yeaps for 15 Pence per pound

Voted To except of Mr Ebenezer Sergeant aforesaid to collect said rates  
Voted That the Assessors give the said Ebenezer Sergeant a warrant to gather said rates  
the meeting was adjourned to Monday June the 15<sup>th</sup> at 6 o'clock  
June 9<sup>th</sup> meet according to adjournment
