


PUSHOUT:

WHAT IS "PUSHOUT?"

Black girls are being disciplined, suspended, arrested, and "pushed out" of the K-12 school system at a higher rate than their white counterparts. This unjust system often creates a pipeline to prison for many Black girls.

Pushout: The Criminalization Of Black Girls In Schools explores not only the problem of this inequity, but seeks solutions from the community, the school system, and society to work towards change.

Erga Pierrette Moderator

This group organizes and facilitates the Pharnal Longus Race, Culture, and Ethnicity High School Workshop annually for students and educators. In her role, she leads a team that cultivates relationships with government officials and non-profit organizations and helps push legislation that will positively impact Black youth in Boston. Alexandria Onuoha is also an Afro-Caribbean and Modern dance artist who uses her art to promote the positive development of Black girls and women and promote social justice efforts. She has performed at the Bates Dance Festival and other concerts.

Abdel Sepulveda is a student-centered instructional leader with sixteen years of experience in education. His passion for teaching the whole student is only second to his commitment to create a more equitable and just society where everyone feels they belong and has the resources they need to be successful. 





